

1. YOU DON'T NEED TO OPEN THE DOOR

ICE cannot enter a home without a valid search warrant signed by a judge.

Ask to see the warrant by having it slipped under the door or or held up to a window.

2. YOU DON'T HAVE TO ANSWER QUESTIONS

You do not have to answer questions about where your were born or how you entered the U.S.

You can choose to stay silent.

3. YOU DON'T NEED TO HAND OVER DOCUMENTS OR SHARE PERSONAL INFORMATION

You are not required to show documents indicating your country of origin.

You should NEVER sign documents without understanding them.

4. IF DETAINED, YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO LEGAL REPRESENTATION

You can request to speak to a lawyer. You have the right to a free call to a lawyer or family member.

Detainees have the right to speak to their country of origin's consulate for assistance.

5. MAKE SURE YOUR ATTORNEY IS A LICENSED LAWYER NOT A PARALEGAL OR NOTARY

Your legal representative must be an experienced and licensed lawyer in the United States.

It is not legal for notary or paralegals to give legal advice under any circumstances.

6. YOU SHOULD HAVE PRINTED COPIES OF LEGAL DOCUMENTS AND IDENTIFICATION WITH YOU AT ALL TIMES

If you already have a lawyer, be sure to carry a hardcopy of their contact information with you at all times.

Always drive with your driver's license. Gather proof of residence. Never present false documents or lie.
